# OMEGA: Opportunities for Multigenerational Exchange, Growth and Action

Through the generous sponsorship of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) <u>AgeLab</u> and <u>AARP Massachusetts</u>, the MIT AgeLab's Opportunities for Multigenerational Exchange, Growth and Action (OMEGA) program is proud to offer **five \$5000 college scholarships** to recognize the efforts that teens are making to create multigenerational connections. **High school juniors and seniors are eligible to apply.** 

Each award will include a \$5000 college scholarship to the winning student and \$1000 to the winning student's intergenerational initiative to support its activities. The OMEGA Scholarship is intended to amplify and support students' contributions to building initiatives, organizations and institutions that connect teens with older adults.

**Applications are due May 31, 2023.** Winners will be announced in late August 2023 and will be invited to present their work at a virtual OMEGA scholarship awards reception (specific date to be determined).

The goal of OMEGA is to strengthen relationships and promote connections across generations. OMEGA convenes student summits, virtual calls and other events each year in an effort to encourage students to connect across generations, brainstorm and share programming ideas, and to plan and carry out intergenerational programs and projects in their communities.

## **OMEGA Scholarship Information**

#### **Eligibility and Application Requirements**

- Applicants must be current high school juniors or seniors attending a high school in the United States serving in initiatives connecting high school students and older adults.
- Applicants must be anticipating completion of a high school diploma in 2023 or 2024 and planning to pursue higher education at an accredited post-secondary institution.
- As part of the application we ask for information about your intergenerational initiative and community partner. An intergenerational initiative refers to the program, project, group, organization or club that you are a part of. A community partner is any organization or place that you may be working with in order to connect students with older adults in your community.
- A complete application for the scholarship must be received. Applications can be submitted through the form on our website (agelab.mit.edu/omega), emailed as a PDF to omegamit@mit.edu, or mailed to: The MIT AgeLab, Attn: OMEGA Scholarship Committee, 77 Massachusetts Avenue, E40-275K, Cambridge, MA 02139. Please email us at omegamit@mit.edu or give us a call (617-253-1894) if you intend to mail in an application so we can keep a look out for it.
- Applications should highlight what you have already done, not theoretical or possible future contributions.
- Photos, videos and other digital media documenting your program are encouraged and can be submitted as supplemental materials.
- Complete applications must include a letter submitted by a recommender attesting to your contributions to multigenerational engagement, including how the scholarship match will be used to further the efforts of the initiative. We prefer to receive recommendations from supervisors, school staff, trusted adults, or community partners who can speak to the work you have done with your intergenerational initiative. The letter should be completed and submitted by your recommender. Guidelines for writing a letter are available on our website: agelab.mit.edu/omega.
- An application will be considered incomplete and will not be reviewed until a recommendation letter has been submitted.

- **Creativity**: The extent to which your intergenerational initiative demonstrates an engaging approach to fostering intergenerational connections.
- **Impact**: The extent to which your intergenerational initiative effectively responds to a significant problem or need among teens and/or older adults.
- **Sustainability**: The extent to which your intergenerational initiative's activities will continue after you graduate.
- **Quality**: The extent to which your application is well-written, well thought-out, organized, and edited. This includes proofreading! Photos, videos and other digital media documenting your work are encouraged and can be submitted as supplemental materials.
- **Recommendation**: How your recommender regards your contributions, leadership efforts, and program sustainability.
